## **History of Librarianship**

<u>1 Origins</u>: The concept of librarianship dates back to ancient civilizations when scribes played the role of collecting and organizing texts. Libraries like the one in Alexandria served as hubs of knowledge in the ancient world.

2 The Middle Ages during the middle Ages, the role of a librarian was typically held by monks who safeguarded and hand-copied religious and scholarly works within the confines of monasteries. **3** <u>**The Printing Revolution:**</u> The invention of the printing press in the 15th century burgeoned the need for librarians, as books became more widely available and libraries grew in number and size.
