Course Description

This course examines the political, economic, and social dimensions of international development. It explores the historical evolution of development theories, the role of states, international organizations, and non-state actors in shaping development policies, and the challenges of achieving sustainable and equitable development in a globalized world. Students will critically analyze case studies, policies, and debates in the field, with a focus on the political dynamics of development.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will:

1. Understand the key theories and concepts in international development.

2. Analyze the role of political institutions, power structures, and governance in development processes.

- 3. Evaluate the impact of globalization, inequality, and environmental challenges on development.
- 4. Critically assess the roles of states, international organizations, and NGOs in development.
- 5. Develop skills in policy analysis and research related to international development.
