Chapter one: Study place

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


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Study Place

1. 1. Introduction

However, there are always some common characteristics of a good study place such as having a desk, a well lit spot, materials in hand, a room, comfortable seats, and no distractions.

P Example:

Here are some of the places that can be effective as a study spot for learners:

- 1. The **bedroom**: a bedroom can be a good study environment as you can have your desk, materials ready, computer, and a comfortable chair and bed. Still, the bedroom cannot be efficient for some learners as they can have distractions such as video games, social media, phone calls, bed ready for long unnecessary naps, and siblings or room-mates sharing your room.
- 2. The **kitchen**: the kitchen can also be a good place of study as it has a table and chairs and it is well lit. Still, it can be inconvenient for some as there are food distractions or family members frequently come to the kitchen.
- 3. The **library**: the library is pre-designed for studying, so it can be the perfect spot for students as it is calm and may have different resources available. However, it can not be the case for some learners as they can easily be distracted by people circulating in the library.
- 4. The **classroom**: as students, they can have free time during the day at the University. So it is a good idea if they can find empty classrooms, benefit from the quiet place, and get their work done.

□ Definition:


Evaluating your study area involves setting the advantages and disadvantages of your place and see what should remain and what should be removed.

☆ Method:

Here are some *questions* questions p.9 you need to be asking yourselves to better understand your choice of a perfect place:

- Are you easily distracted?
- Do you tend to move a lot when you are in your room?
- Do you get a lot of visitors?
- Do you get a lot of phone calls?
- Are there many things in your room that you enjoy doing, such as spending time on your computer, phone, watching television, playing video games, or falling asleep for an unplanned nap?

If you answer 'yes' to at least one of the above questions, then it means that you need to revisit your location of study and look for a place that has fewer distractions.

Good and bad criteria of a study place

6.1. a. Distraction

□ Definition:

A distraction can be in different forms, such as: a noise, people talking to you, phone calls, social media, and television.

☆ Method:

To select your free distraction study area, some important points need to be highlighted:

- Choose a location away from tempting leisure activities.
- Consider a location with minimal visual and auditory distractions.
- choose a quiet area to avoid interruptions from phone calls.
- Opt from a space that encourages focus and minimizes movements.
- Select a space with privacy to avoid interruptions from visitors.

6.2. b. Location Standards

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One of the most crucial criteria to select a place is to choose the best location that stimulates your learning. This can change from one person to another as it depends on your own learning style.

V Fundamental:

The location standards Location standards p.9 requests:

- Accessible sites: a place where you can easily access, such as your bedroom.
- Comfortable place: a place where there are convenient seats, tables, and a warm temperature.
- Light: a place where it is well-lit and has a pleasing atmosphere.
- Materials: a place where you have access to or can use easily your material of study, such as books, computers, papers, etc.

6.3. c. Personal Preferences

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Students also have to choose their location based on their personal preferences, which has to do with their personalities and learning styles. For instance, some students prefer quiet areas, whereas others may need noisy backgrounds. This process of selecting the perfect spot can vary from one person to another.
